COMMITMENT 1: HIGH QUALITY EDUCATION

- Worked with 1,622 David Douglas School District (DDSD)
 5th graders as a part of Farm School. Survey results showed that 100% of students agreed the experience at Zenger Farm fostered and encouraged comfort in the natural world.
- 1,509 youth visited the farm during field trips in 2022, this included our new winter field trip offerings centered around herbalism, nature crafting, native trees, and macro-catch investigation.
- Hosted 7 afterschool program cohorts, serving 84 students at 3 different DDSD locations in partnership with the Immigrant and Refugee Community Organization's (IRCO) Schools Uniting Neighborhoods (SUN) program.
- Provided no cost admission to our summer camp for 28 families. Overall, the median household income for summer camp families was 22% less compared to the overall median in Portland.
- Partnered with ROSE Community Development for summer programming and hosted 26 children from ROSE buildings for fun, interactive farm visits.
- Graduated 4 beginning farm apprentices from our 7.5
 month farmer training program that focuses on organic,
 small-scale, climate resistant farming practices.
- Relaunched the Community Chef program as a two-year fellowship cohort who started entrepreneurship and small business development coursework with MESO (Micro Enterprise Services of Oregon).

COMMITMENT 2:

ACCESS TO NOURISHING FOOD

 CSA Partnerships for Health provided 300 summer vegetable 'prescriptions' and 80 winter vegetable 'prescriptions' to Multnomah County households over the course of 46 weeks.

In total, providing 7,560 weekly shares through 110 in-person clinic pick-ups and 960 winter deliveries.

 Zenger Farm's neighborhood CSA, which operates under a sliding-scale model, provided 135 shares that fed over 200 people.

65 of these shares were distributed to the Mid County Health Center as part of the CSA Partnerships for Health program.

• Community Chefs produced 1,225 meals and 35 menus featuring farm fresh produce for our Open Farm Days.



COMMITMENT 3:

BUILD STRONG COMMUNITIES

- March to November, 946 people in total participated in seasonal activities at 35 weekly Open Farm Days.
- Our annual Dia de los Muertos Celebration attracted over 300 people to Zenger Farm to honor ancestors with altars, food, music, and dancing, making it our largest event of the year.
- At our Spring for Zenger event we distributed over 8,000 plant starts, 5 cubic yards of compost and 40 grow bags to community members.
- Community Chefs prepared and served over 800 culturally relevant meals for our large community events.
- Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) Partnerships for Health redistributed over \$200,000 to small scale regional farmers, fostering greater opportunities for farmers, including the addition of four new BIPOC-owned farms.



COMMITMENT 4:


STRENGTHEN ORGANIZATIONAL CAPACITY

- Set up the organization for our 2023 transition to a 32 hour work week by increasing staffing and advancing technology solutions.
- Increased pay and expanded benefits for all positions across the organization.
- Improved our facilities with maintenance projects, including painting our office and classroom spaces and upgrading our farmhouse and kitchen appliances.
- Grew individual monthly donations by 114% through our Seedlings monthly donor program.
- Streamlined program development and evaluation by instituting cross-programmatic tracking systems.




2022 FINANCIALS
